From the President ...

I've been reflecting what 'spins my wheels' in my role and I realised that I get joy from people feeling valued and seeing Beth Shalom as their tūrangawaewae - a place where they feel empowered and connected.

Sitting in shul when Lucas read from the parsha Vayeira, I was struck by the story of Abraham greeting the three strangers that approached his tent:

Looking up, he saw: lo-three men standing opposite him! Seeing [them], he ran from the entrance of the tent to meet them, and, bowing down to the ground, he said, "My lords, if I have found favour in your sight, please do not pass your servant by. Let a little water be brought; then wash your feet and recline under a tree, and let me bring a bit of bread and you can restore yourselves. Then you can go on – now that you have come across your servant."

It made me think about why people 'come into our tent'. From my observations there are two main reasons - Most people join Beth Shalom because they want a sense of connection to Judaism and /or to a community. It also made me think about the experience of being welcomed to the Beth Shalom family.

This year, with its long periods of needing to physically isolate from others, has made it harder to create community and friendships. We have not had as many opportunities to bump into people at services or events and strike up conversations and friendships.

Creating community is work for us all. In this Teruah you'll find a call to volunteer for our new initiative - to 'buddy' with a new member. I ask you please to respond to this call and to be part of the 'glue' that binds this community together.

'Glue' comes in many forms, and I'd also like to take this opportunity to offer sincere and heartfelt thanks to everyone who gave so generously to our High Holy Day appeal. Thanks to you, we now have \$9.5k to support our community to come together: socially, spiritually and joyfully.

Another essential part of our 'glue' are all our volunteers, who work tirelessly. Without you, we would have no services, no money, no community care, no burials, no Hebrew school. The Beth Shalom that we see, experience, and enjoy is because of all of you. "Thank you" is inadequate to express how much you are valued and appreciated.

New Member Buddies ...

Are you interested in becoming a buddy for a new member?

Shalom, my name's Sandra van Eden, this is my second year on the board and I have recently taken on the new member portfolio. We are pleased to hear that some new members report feeling warmly welcomed and have easily made friends within the community, but some newcomers I have spoken to recently are finding it harder. Some are not just new to our synagogue but are also new to Auckland and/or New Zealand and some are new to Judaism so there can be multiple steep learning curves, and this year, Covid-19 has made it even more challenging.

In parashat *Vayera* (*Genesis 18.1 to 22.24*) Abraham and Sarah welcome three strangers into their tent and feed them, and they tell Sarah that at the age of 80 she will bear a child. This story highlights the importance hospitality plays in Jewish communities and some say welcoming the stranger is our first mitzvah.

I am interested in finding ways to help all new members experience a warm, hospitable welcome and developing a sense of connection to our community from the beginning. To enable this, I am interested in trialling partnering new members with a 'Beth Shalom Buddy'. A buddy could be someone who lives near the new member, they might come from the same country and/or speak the same language/s, be similar in age, have children of similar ages or be completely different!

What does being a Beth Shalom Buddy entail? The answer will be different for every new member and buddy combination. For a start, it might be an invitation to a shabbat dinner, a playdate for children or answering the questions that newcomers to Auckland or Judaism will have. As a buddy it will be up to you to decide how you could welcome a stranger into our community in a way that works both for you and the new member.


As part of her Bat Mitzvah Aurora is running a tzedakah (charity project) and would appreciate your support with this.

Ritcom Reports .. The Surprising Origin of the Dreidel

One of the features of our annual Chanukah party is our dreidel derby. Ever wondered the origin of the dreidel? Have a read below, with thanks to My Jewish Learning. It is a little surprising.

The well-known Hanukkah symbol has Christmastime roots.

The dreidel or *sevivon* is perhaps the most famous custom associated with Hanukkah. Indeed, various rabbis have tried to find an integral connection between the dreidel and the Hanukkah story; the standard explanation is that the letters *nun*, *gimmel*, *hey*, *shin*, which appear on the dreidel in the Diaspora, stand for nes*gadol haya sham-* "a great miracle happened **there**," while in Israel the dreidel says*nun*, *gimmel*, *hey*, *pey*, which means "a great miracle happened **here**."

One 19th-century rabbi maintained that Jews played with the dreidel in order to fool the Greeks if they were caught studying Torah, which had been outlawed. Others figured out elaborate *gematriot* [numerological explanations based on the fact that every Hebrew letter has a numerical equivalent] and word plays for the letters *nun*, *gimmel*, *hey*, *shin*. For example, *nun*, *gimmel*, *hey*, *shin*in *gematria* equals 358, which is also the numerical equivalent of *mashiach* or Messiah!

Finally, the letters nun, gimmel, hey, shin are supposed to represent the four kingdoms that tried to destroy us [in ancient times]: N = Nebuchadnetzar = Babylon; H = Haman = Persia = Madai; G = Gog = Greece; and S = Seir = Rome.



As a matter of fact, all of these elaborate explanations were invented after the fact.

The dreidel game originally had nothing to do with Hanukkah; it has been played by various people in various languages for many centuries.

In England and Ireland there is a game called *totum* or *teetotum* that is especially popular at Christmastime. In English, this game is first mentioned as "totum" ca. 1500-1520. The name comes from the Latin "totum," which means "all." By 1720, the game was called T- totum or teetotum, and by 1801 the four letters already represented four words in English: T = Take all; H = Half; P = Put down; and N = Nothing.

Our Eastern European game of dreidel (including the letters *nun*, *gimmel*, *hey*, *shin*) is directly based on the German equivalent of the *totum* game: N = Nichts = nothing; G = Ganz = all; H = Halb = half; and S = Stell ein = put in. In German, the spinning top was called a "torrel" or "trundl," and in Yiddish it was called a "dreidel," a "fargl," a "varfl" [= something thrown], "shtel ein" [= put in], and "gor, gorin" [= all].

When Hebrew was revived as a spoken language, the dreidel was called, among other names, a sevivon, which is the one that caught on.

Thus the dreidel game represents an irony of Jewish history. In order to celebrate the holiday of Hanukkah, which celebrates our victory over cultural assimilation, we play the dreidel game, which is an excellent example of cultural assimilation! Of course, there is a world of difference between imitating non-Jewish games and worshiping idols, but the irony remains nonetheless.

The 'Children of Abraham' organised this year's panel discussion on 'Preserving the Environment: Abrahamic Faiths in Dialogue' in which sustainability was explored. Dr Emily Colgan (Christianity), Senior Lecturer at Trinity College, Amr Saleh (Islam), Auckland City Hospital Imam and Debbie Miller (Judaism), Beth Shalom Educator shared insights and referenced relevant scriptures on the topic.

The panel discussion took place at Beth Shalom. Our President, Olga Bernstein, delivered the official welcome on behalf of all three organisations behind this event. What became clear from all three talks was how the Abrahamic Faith Groups are well positioned to play a leading role in stimulating action to preserve our environment. We have a Biblical duty to be guardians who protect our planet. While each speaker took a slightly different approach to presenting their talks, there was significant commonality across them. After a Q and A with all three speakers Paul Wilton wrapped up the event with the vote of thanks. On behalf of the three speakers, and Yasir who will be leaving his role at the Pearl of the Islands Foundation, native trees were planted in recognition of their contribution. The event concluded with some light refreshments with the opportunity for attendees to mix and mingle.

'Children of Abraham' - an Abrahamic religions interfaith initiative - was formed by the Pearl of the Islands Foundation, Holy Trinity Cathedral, and the Beth Shalom, in order to promote mutual understanding, co-operation, and pro-active inclusion of all who stand in the Abrahamic tradition.


Join us to celebrate Chanukah and Support the World Union!

Collection of over 60 Jewish community oral history interviews given to Auckland Public Libraries

In 1994 a group interested in interviewing people in the Auckland Jewish community met to set up a formal group as a subcommittee of the Auckland Jewish Council. The initial focus at that time was to interview Holocaust survivors living in Auckland, however, concurrently, another group of interviews was being done, of people who were and are prominent in the community.

Early interviews were initiated by the late Shirley Ross in the 1980s and are ongoing. The Shirley Ross interviews, as well as a number of taped interviews, speeches and other material held by the Auckland Jewish community were brought together and grouped under the heading of "Community Identities". As with all the interviews held by the Auckland Jewish Oral History Group these have been digitized. The collection is made up of interviews for the main part, but there are also folders of papers, speeches and documents or other material collected.

Included in the collection are interviews with such people as Percy Bookman, David Pezaro, Hetty Moss, David Ross, Dian Ross, Rena Ross, David Stern, Olive Manning, David Nathan, Wendy Ross, Ada Cohen, Barbara Goodman, David Levene, Arnold Treister to name a few. Numbering approximately 60, copies of these interviews have now been given to the Auckland Public Libraries so that they will be publicly available. This has been possible with a generous grant from a community member and the interviews have now been formatted so that the collection can be accessioned into the Libraries' system.

The interviewers have been many but include the following:

Edwina Myers, Suzanne Szusterman, Anthony Hart, Claire Bruell, Freda Narev, Ilse Stein, Shirley Ross and many others. The Community Identity interviews will be named in the library catalogue and the interviews will be available by visiting the library, once accessioned by library staff. Each will be accompanied by a Consent form governing access, signed by the interviewee at the time of the interview. We are confident that the collection will provide valuable material for the community and others going forward, when researching the history of the Auckland Jewish community.
