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FROM THE RABBI

I was in shock, grasping the steering wheel tight as my car descended into the LA Basin. The entire sky was dark brown and my mouth suddenly tasted of soot. I was driving into a hot zone, collecting Jacob from my mother's house in West Los Angeles. I had seen reports of the fire, but still could not fathom the extent of the damage.

Every puff of smoke, every breath, every scent on the wind used to be something else: now, perhaps, the sofa where a grandmother loved to sit and read, now the ugly jumper someone else never wore, now a child's fingerpainting. Choking on one another's lives is an eerie feeling, at once horrific and intimate.

The Book of Exodus describes the encounters between Moses and Pharaoh. Their "negotiations" quickly devolve. With each impasse, God ups the ante by sending plagues, demonstrating Divine power over the natural world: blood, frogs, lice, insects, disease, boils, hail, locusts, darkness... With each new horror, Pharaoh acquiesces just a bit (but not enough), and the process repeats until its ultimate, wrenching, redemptive conclusion.

I've sung these plagues at seders and studied this text through the years. I've even lived through plagues (AIDS, Covid). But I had never before experienced such an otherworldly sensation as I did in Los Angeles on 9 January 2025. It was overwhelming and disconcerting, especially since much of the city was still at work: traffic lights, restaurants, appointments. Everything was the same and everything was different. Perhaps you've experienced that, too.

Why did God send plagues instead of simply changing Pharaoh's mind? And why did all Egyptians need to experience them? How deeply unjust of God to cause even the enslaved girl toiling at the millstone to suffer, when self-centered Pharaoh was an audience of one.



Because we are, all of us, complicit in systems of oppression and consumption. We, human begins who share oxygen and cities and networks, eat and wear other people's labour. Although we believe ourselves to be independent, we create one another's realities. We breathe one another's existences whether we realise it or not.

Even the kindly Egyptian benefited from cheap labour. Even the one who hated the system enjoyed its benefits.

We know by now that climate change is at work, making Planet Earth hotter, drier, wetter. Even so, we keep spewing carbon as we skip past tipping points. We who live in highly developed countries, who read these words on devices, who eat produce out of season and buy what we don't need, who drive into Los Angeles in rented cars and fly out on jumbo jets, we are responsible. We did not strike the match or wield the whip, but we added to the burden.

Abraham Joshua Heschel observed: "Few are guilty, but all are responsible."

We are the Israelites, and we are the Egyptians. The time is now; a hot wind blows for us all.





FROM THE PRESIDENT

My emotions have been running high this past fortnight, watching with tension then joy and tears the video snippets and photos of the release of the seven female hostages from Gaza. I am relieved and hopeful that the cease-fire holds and that the negotiations for the second phase progress without delay.

Arzenu and Arza-New Zealand

Israeli citizens get a vote in the Knesset, but all Jews can vote at the World Zionist Congress (WZC). The WZC elections determine the political power balance in the National Institutions. A strong election result for Arzenu ensures that the global Reform/progressive movement will maximise its political influence and provide access to significant funds distributed by the Zionist movement.

How this money is spent is decided based on the strength of the various parties represented at the WZC. Arzenu supports values of religious pluralism and inclusion:

- · We believe that it is unacceptable that in the Jewish State our non-Orthodox way of being Jewish is not fully recognized
- · Gender equality and LGBTQ+ rights are core Jewish values for us, which is why we work with the Reform movement in Israel on these issues
- · We hold Israel to account on the promise of the Declaration of Independence to "foster the development of the country for all its inhabitants" including non-Jewish minorities (from https://www.arzenu.org/about/).

NZ needs to vote by May for its single representative at the WZC in October. We hope the NZ mandate goes to Arza-NZ. Rabbi Rube (representing Mizrahi) and I (representing Arzenu) have been appointed by the WZO to the NZ Elections Committee – more information to come. When you renew your annual Beth Shalom membership, I hope you will opt-in to register to vote in the NZ election.

Union for Progressive Judaism (UPJ) and KiwiPJ Shabbat Gathering

I am excited that we are hosting the UPJ and KiwiPJ gathering on 21-22 March. People will be coming from all over NZ to join us for a wonderful Shabbat weekend.

We will begin with Kol Nefesh on Friday at 6.30pm and end with Havdallah on Saturday evening. The inaugural leadership programme that I am organising with a grant from WUPJ will follow on Sunday with 26 registered participants from every KiwiPJ-affiliated community.

California Fires 2025 - A Message from a former member

"I arrived in LA in late November of 2023. It took nearly three months before I finally found a long term home in Pasadena. Passover snuck up on me and I found a local synagogue called Pasadena Jewish Temple and Centre (PJTC). The Second Night Community Seder there was wonderful and a friendly community greeted me. All were very curious why someone would leave the lush green paradise that is New Zealand. Thereafter, I attended festivals and services at PJTC. By September I was a member and had joined the PJTC 20/30s group.

After my return to LA in December from New Zealand, I celebrated New Years and Hanukkah with the PJTC and the 20/30s group.

The first Kabbalat Shabbat of 2025 at PJTC was a special night, as the morning would see a young woman become Bat Mitzvah, and per our minchag she was presented a few gifts at that service.

Now as I look back and think of that Friday night, I can hardly believe that only a week later it would all be gone.

The entire temple and school were destroyed in the fire. Thirty members of our community lost their homes to that same fire. A further 45 members are displaced from their home due to damage from smoke and smaller blazes that occurred.

As I recite the words of Hashkiveinu, I think of the members who lost all shelters of peace. Please as you pray for a canopy of peace in your evening prayers, think of all those who have lost their own shelters. It will be years to make things anew but our community will stay strong with hope for the future."

The Auckland Jewish Burial and Benevolent Society continues to function throughout the year. During the past year we have welcomed new committee members and it is timely to introduce our committee to you. Currently the position of President is vacant but we hope this will be filled at our AGM in March. Our current committee members are: Vice President: David Zussman, Treasurer: Jack Wilton; Secretary: Sue Pezaro; Beth Shalom Board representative: Stephanie Richling; Haim Ainsworth, Julie Dick, Sonja Karon, Stephanie Markson, and David Singer. The committee meets each month to plan and review the services we provide to the community, and to consider applications for financial assistance.


The purpose of the B and B is to provide Jewish burial services and to support those who are managing end of life issues or have lost a loved one, and to provide assistance to people with particular benevolence needs. Usually benevolence is in the form of a one-off grant, for example to meet the cost of a medical appointment, an unexpected bill, or emergency travel. Requests for assistance can be made directly to the B and B committee or through Community Care.

We remind members of Beth Shalom that the B and B is a distinct entity; membership of Beth Shalom does not include membership of the B and B. However membership of Beth Shalom is not a prerequisite for membership of the B and B and a person who is not a member of any synagogue may be accepted as a member of the B and B.

The benefit of membership of the B and B is that there is no charge to members for the conduct of the funeral service and minyan whether by a rabbi or lay reader. Where a funeral is conducted for a person who is not a member of the B and B or Beth Shalom, there will be a charge for those services. It is important to note that the membership subscription for the B and B does not cover the costs of a funeral. Members of Beth Shalom and the B and B must meet the costs of the funeral director, including the plot and casket. These costs are substantial and we encourage members to plan for them.

The last year has been a busy one for the B and B with special projects as well as our usual work. The highlights were some valuable tuition from Rabbi Dean around Shiva Minyan which has provided a group of people ability to conduct a shiva minyan service, and a tachrichim sewing bee initiated by Jann Singer and Sonja Karon.

ANEW ERA FOR MOISHE HOUSE



After nearly four years, the time has come for the current Moishe House residents, Sapeer Mayron, Seth Schanzer and Daniel Josephs, to pass on the torch to the next group of keen Jewish flatmates in Auckland.

Applications are now open for at least three wonderful Jews between the ages of 22 and 30 to take on the mantle of being the Auckland Moishe House – running or hosting regular events for our young adult/young professional community!

What is Moishe House?

Moishe House is the global leader in peer-led Jewish young adult engagement between the ages of 22 and 32. Moishe House operates 159 houses across 30 countries. Moishe House's mission is to provide an answer to the perennial question facing Jewish diaspora communities: how do we engage young Jews in their 20s and 30s?







Moishe House's answer is simple. It has created a model in which young Jews are empowered to build their own Jewish communities and programming, by turning their home into the hub of Jewish life for their friends and peers. Moishe Houses are led by three-to-five residents who share a rented home in which they host events for their peers in exchange for a rent subsidy.

Moishe House Auckland

Moishe House Auckland was established in early 2016 as a pluralistic and non-denominational community for Jewish young adults and young professionals. Our community comprises Jews (and their partners) of all backgrounds from modern orthodox, to reform, to the unaffiliated. Our mission is to create a thriving Jewish community of young adults in Auckland.

We run 4-5 events per month, using our flat as a base. We host anywhere between 10 - 50 people at our events, depending on the type of event. We are the largest provider of programming for Jewish Young adults between the ages of 22 - 32 in New Zealand. Since 2016, over 500+ individual participants have attended an event at Moishe House Auckland and we have facilitated over 300+ programmes or activities (e.g. shabbat dinners, seders, hikes, shabbaton, Purim parties, Tikkun Leil, Reverse Tashlich, Torah study sessions, weekly social soccer, chagim, Judaica arts and crafts, and interfaith events).

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Our events are designed to celebrate and embrace diversity within Judaism as an ethnic and cultural identity, and to empower our peers to be leaders in the Jewish community.

"Speaking personally, running Auckland's Moishe House for the last three and a half years has been a blur of shabbat dinners, chagim, cooking, movie nights, outings around town, hikes in the Waitākeres and the most wonderful conversations. I've made my closest friends through this experience, and I am really proud of the work we've been doing to make sure Jews here have somewhere to call home, to feel safe and comfortable and kvetch together." - Sapeer Mayron



Our first Crafty Club Meeting for 2025!


