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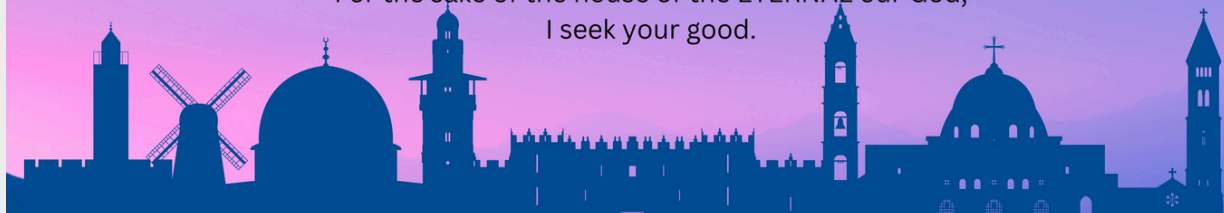

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THE RABBI'S PEN

It's the last day of Sukkot, as I write this, and I'm sitting in Beth Shalom's sukkah one more time. No children are squealing. No lulavim are shaking. Instead, I hear the song of birds, the whrrr of cars, and the rustle of wind through the schach. We've had fine weather most of the week but today it's overcast; I'm glad I'm wearing my jumper. Sitting here, I reflect back on the High Holy Days now concluded. I think especially of all your faces – open, expectant, hopeful, tired, bereft. I remember the sound of our voices combining in song, the plea of the cello on Kol Nidre, the scream of the shofar. I feel all the good wishes of our community, the delight we take in being together.

I look above me, at the palm fronds, and around me, at the wraparound green walls. In a few days, they'll be gone.

The sukkah is an insecure dwelling by design. Rain and wind can enter. Sitting here, I think about David Zussman's talk on Yom Kippur afternoon. He's an expert in community housing, and he reminded us just how many people in our own city lack safe, reliable, affordable homes. Working families are struggling all around us. Uni students and other young adults lack options. Older people feel trapped. Houses are cold in winter. People are forced to live further and further from work, adding to congestion. And the situation is getting worse, not better.

David introduced us to Marlon Drake of Te Ohu Whakawhanaunga, a broad-based coalition of organisations across Auckland, working "toward a future where children and families flourish." Beth Shalom recently joined Te Ohu, the only synagogue amongst churches, trusts, ethnic groups, labour unions, and other community groups, all pulling together to improve life in our city.

Te Ohu uses Community Organising, a process whereby individuals speak to one another about what's troubling them, famously, "what keeps them up at night." Through these listening campaigns, Te Ohu establishes a focus for its work, seeking to harness the energy and power of so many groups to effect meaningful and sustainable change where people need it most. They often meet with elected officials and ask for commitments on behalf of the public good.

This year, Te Ohu is focused on housing in the greater Auckland area. Beth Shalom will hold events in January and February so that we can hear one another's stories, better understand the situation, and determine appropriate courses of action. All of us – in every neighbourhood, regardless of age, whether renters, owners, or landlords – will be invited to participate. This is a shared problem, so solutions must be shared, too.

As Jews, we know how it feels to be alone. We also know how it feels to be in community, and how partnership brings understanding and impact. It's important that we're in this coalition, working towards a more just society. If you're interested in being part of this Social Justice work, please do let me know.

TO E-SHAMMOS OR NOT TO E-SHAMMOS?

During lockdown I was asked as a one off to help out by being an eshammos over the Yom Tovim. Not having had the mitzvah before I jumped in at the deep end. To say it was all smooth sailing would be stretching the truth!

As no-one could attend services in person we had a captive audience, not only from Beth Shalom but it was great that we had folks from all over the world, Temple Sinai and members of the AHC.

The large numbers, a few technical issues and my lack of experience in online meetings made things a bit challenging. On the upside I met new people, saw folk from Temple Sinai I hadn't seen or spoken for years, and as strange as it may seem, there was a strong connection of everyone coming together celebrating as best we could.

Move forward to 2024 and I was once again asked to help out being eShammose, but on a permanent basis.

How times have changed, the online services have become an integrated part of what we do at Beth Shalom, the preparation and training was comprehensive, Naomi has documented the process that even I could understand, the practice ZOOM sessions helped to set me at ease.

To be honest I was disappointed that, more often than not, the number of participants that have been attending is less than five, a couple of times there has only been myself and one other online.

Was this commitment really worthwhile? A couple of months in I talked to a couple of members of the congregation and they told me how much the availability of the online services meant to them. One person is a country member unable to travel the distance to Shule, another was not well enough to attend services in person.

The availability of ZOOM services gave them the ability to pray with others and enabled them to be spiritually involved in our community. This enlightening feed back made me feel the few hours I spend as eShammos was definitely worthwhile. In the case of online services it is not the numbers that count.

Many of us have learnt the Hebrew parts of the service off by heart as we spent endless hours with our kids going over the Amidah and other prayers for their Bat or Bar Mitzvot. As eShammos I have had to follow the written service so I can turn the page at the appropriate time,

I have found a lot of relevance to my life and current issues around the world in prayers written in English. As I said for me an added bonus of being an eShammos.

One has a choice of how we spend our 730 hours a month, I have found giving 4 or 5 a month to being an eShammos extremely rewarding.

We welcomed the moments to honour the memory of our late friend, Rachel Denyss, with the placing of her headstone, and also to acknowledge the family of David Levin, among others.

We reported earlier on the recent training session for shiva minyan leaders. In response to feedback, Rabbi Dean plans a second session for people who attended that introduction. This session will focus on enhancing your skills for conducting the minyan service.

The leading of shiva minyanim is a significant adjunct to the practical and pastoral work of B&B volunteers, an opportunity to provide further consolation to bereaved families.

Just a reminder - the B&B's role includes "benevolence". In these hard times, we may be able to help you when financial crises and challenges arise. Please don't hesitate to call or email us.

Over the next few months, we hope to begin to put together a revised information pamphlet about our work. We know this can be helpful to families, where one of their members is approaching end of life. We need also to provide some reference material for hospices and care agencies who are unfamiliar with Jewish practice.

Among other ongoing tasks, we continue to investigate options for "green" burial and extension of available space for graves.

We send condolences and "long life" wishes to all of you observing yahrzeit at this time. May the memories of your loved ones be for a blessing.

First Anniversary of October 7 Attacks

Two weeks ago marked the first anniversary of the attacks in southern Israel. Commemorative events were held in the main centres at which a number of representatives from across the political spectrum attended. A number of individuals and organisations including the Council put a great deal of effort and planning into these events.

Security Incidents in New Zealand

We are aware of an attack that has occurred on a Jewish business in New Zealand. Additionally, some prominent Jewish and Zionist organisations have been receiving hate mail that appears to be from the same person. The envelopes have handwritten addresses and 109/110 on the back. If you receive or see one, please do not open it. Place it in a plastic bag and contact CSG.

The CSG is liaising with the relevant authorities on these matters but we would remind all community members to remain vigilant at all times.

We will share more information if and when we are able, but we emphasise that the CSG has developed a strong relationship with the police and other security agencies.

Troubling Times in Melbourne

Katy Barnett, a professor at Melbourne Law School and part of the Australian Academic Alliance Against Antisemitism wrote this article in The Age detailing the experience of a professor colleague of hers who was targeted for antisemitic attack by protestors.

Professor Steven Prawer is an observant Jew who wears a kippah. His supposed “crime” is his association with a joint PhD program between the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and the University of Melbourne. Currently, the program assists PhD students in researching how birds navigate and new drug treatments. Of the many people associated with the program, only Prawer was singled out for attention by the protestors.

On the week of October 7, a protest was held on the University of Auckland campus, using the chant “There is only one solution: intifada revolution.” The Council continues to communicate and work with senior staff at various universities about the conduct of some of its academics and students

New Zealand's UN Vote

Community members will no doubt have seen New Zealand's confused vote at the UN. Even the Government realises that it was a strange approach. We encourage community members to voice their concerns with the local Member of Parliament or write a letter to the Prime Minister or Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Christchurch City Council vote

A petition to the CCC called for the council to adopt a BDS policy to avoid using any companies that do business with settlements in the occupied territories. Despite submissions opposing the motion from the Jewish community, the resolution was passed making the CCC the first council in New Zealand to adopt a BDS stance. This has been endorsed by the Labour Party.

Ngapuhi Event for Outgoing Israeli Ambassador (and news about new Ambassador Coming)

The Israeli ambassador is leaving New Zealand as his term finishes. Ngapuhi leaders recently hosted an event for Ambassador Yaakoby, at which he was gifted a korowai in the colours of the Israeli flag. The NZJC was represented at the event by Juliet Moses.

The new Ambassador, Alon Snir Ruth, has been appointed. Most recently he was appointed as the envoy to lead diplomatic efforts aimed at securing the release of the hostages in Gaza. Before that, he was Deputy Ambassador to the UK.
