FROM THE PRESIDENT

I have just come home from our Board leadership retreat and as usual feel inspired. Great energy, great vibe, and an overall sense of motivation and enthusiasm for serving our community. Thank you to Rabbi Dean for leading the day and challenging us. We started with reviewing around our own Mission and Vision statements and considering them in context of progressive Jewish values as stated by the URJ. We ended with a thoughtful presentation by Te Ohu Tāmaki, a community alliance that organises to make change on social issues, such as housing.

In the middle, we worked on developing 1- and 3-year strategic plans for each of our portfolios/teams. It was great to have representation from Education (James), Community Care (Viv) and Ritual (Naomi) Committees participate in this section of the day. My clear take-away was that we have to have a plan in order to make progress, and that the plans will help inform how we spend our resources, both people and budget. For example, in our membership working group, we started with the overarching function of creating 'a deep sense of belonging.' One of our short-term goals was to put in place a process to manage membership. We listed several actions that would be needed to meet this goal, and then when all the teams reported back, we added more, as it became clear that there were so many overlapping areas within our shul systems that link with membership. We aim to report to the community about our progress at the AGM next March.

We have had a busy few weeks, celebrating Benji's Bar Mitzvah, hosting a session led by the Irwin Cotler foundation on the challenge of being Jewish in the 21st century, an energetic Term 3 Yachad start, and the 3rd fabulous learning session for our 13-15 year olds with Tali Josephs, We had a great turnout to our recent potluck Shabbat dinner where services were led by Rabbi Dean and the Habo madrichim; thanks Mika and team for organising.

July was a busy month for the B&B, with sad news of two deaths. Our condolences to the families of Miriam Kauders and Annmay Rose.

"We are often asked about the simplicity of Jewish customs around our rituals of farewelling loved ones."

We are often asked about the simplicity of Jewish customs around our rituals of farewelling loved ones. These include the practice of dressing the deceased in simple white linen garments.

The source for this custom comes from ancient text, in the Gemara (Ketubot, 1. 9a 43). The question is asked: What is the connection between Rabban Gamliel and a house of mourning?

The response is given: "It is as it is taught ... Initially, the funeral expenditures for the deceased were more taxing for his relatives than his death, as the burials were opulent, until it reached a point where people would abandon the deceased and flee. This continued until Rabbi Gamliel came and conducted himself in a self-deprecatory manner, instructing the people that they were to take him for burial in plain linen garments. And all the people conducted themselves following his example, and instructed their families to take them for burial in plain linen garments."

Rav Pappa said: And today, everyone is accustomed to bury the dead in plain garments, even in rough cloth ... worth one zuz.

This custom has not outlived its appropriateness! It endures in our modern times.

Elsewhere we find information that Torah mantles and wrappings that have worn out beyond repair, may be used as tachrichim, specifically for a "met mtzvah" Le burial of a person who wouldn't otherwise have anyone to attend to their burial, or whose family are too poor to afford the shrouds. (Tur, Orach Chaim 154)

Fortunately, we are unlikely to need this resource here in AotearoaNZ. Just last week, in Auckland, our wonderful, skilled sewing team completed the sacred task of cutting, sewing and packaging sets of tachrichim/burial shrouds. Thank you, Sonja, Jann, Julie, Jude, Steph, Chris and Jack. We are blessed with the work of your hands.

The New Zealand Jewish Community Security Group Charitable Trust (CSG) has appointed Lee Savage to the position of Regional Security OCicer Auckland (RSO Auckland) & AJCC Security Lead eCective 12 August 2024.

The CSG has long been a feature of Jewish communal life in New Zealand, and professional security executives and operational teams are a common feature of many Jewish communities around the world, including in Australia and the UK.

CSG's purpose is to protect Jewish life and Jewish way of life in New Zealand. CSG's vision is a New Zealand society and environment where Jewish people are free to practise their religion and culture, and participate in New Zealand civil society, without fear of harm, harassment, or persecution.

The RSO Auckland & AJCC Security Lead position is government-funded, and Lee will report to the CSG National Security OCicer (Mark Day) and the AJCC Hub Manager (Malindy Rose) and be based out of the AJCC in Remuera, Auckland.

CSG and AJCC look forward to welcoming Lee to the community and, in particular, introducing him to our members and stakeholders around the Auckland region. We know that he will be a superb asset to us all.

PUBLIC NOTICE: WATERCARE WORKS IN THE EPSOM AREA

Members are urged to keep in mind when travelling to and from the Synagogue in Epsom that there will be works undertaken by Watercare to replace the Huia 1 watermain that runs from water reservoirs in Konini Road, Titirangi through to Epsom.

The map below shows the section of works on Gillies Avenue, King George Avenue and St Andrews Road, Epsom. The work is estimated to start mid-to late August 2024 and will take until approximately late January 2024 to complete (these are current best guess estimates and are subject to change).



How will this affect members or visitors?

- Working hours will be from 7am to 6.30pm, Monday to Friday and 7am to 4pm on Saturday including some Statutory Holidays.
- Please note that traffic on Gillies Avenue will be shifted over to the eastern side of the road to maintain two lanes of traffic, however there may be lane or road closures on the other sections.
- Some street parking will need to be temporarily removed near the work site to allow traffic management to be set up as part of the approved traffic management plan.
- Construction works will generate some noise and vibration; however, levels will be kept to a minimum and in accordance with Auckland Council and consent requirements.
